Federal Way Open Doors & Seattle Education Access

Staff Lead: Monique Miles, Aspen Institute Forum for Community Solutions

In 2015, Federal Way Open Doors was created to address the needs of the scholars in the region who found themselves unable to finish high school in a traditional high school. The scholars we serve need flexibility in order to balance the many responsibilities they have and/or overcome barriers and obstacles to education due to life circumstances.

Originally, the program was online and credit-based. Over time, we found that particular model serves only a certain type of learner; therefore, our program has evolved to become competencybased. Our youth have access to GED certification and a project-based learning with online options if appropriate through the development of an individualized learning plan. Our staff provides academic coaching and support and strong case-management in addition to relying on community-based organizations to meet all the needs of our scholars. Every year we have doubled our enrollment, graduation outcomes and college enrollment. 100% of our graduates are college and career connected. The youth we serve comment that having access to food, 12 open hours and relationships with caring adults is our program's biggest strengths.

Seattle Education Access (SEA) was founded in 2002 as a drop-in center in Seattle's University District to help homeless youth prepare for, access, and graduate from higher education programs. We provide intensive, one-on-one mentorship to help each student create a life, career, and academic plan so they have the support and resources available to succeed in school and become economically self-sufficient. SEA's mission is "to provide higher education advocacy and opportunity to young people struggling to overcome poverty and adversity in King County."

In 2011, SEA relocated our program staff to partner sites across King County to be more accessible to students in areas with high rates of poverty and educational inequity. SEA staff are now stationed in every region of urban King County so students can get support at a location and time that is convenient for them. At the core of our program model, SEA acts as the liaison between over 50 agencies, including GED programs, alternative high schools, basic needs centers, community and technical colleges, and housing programs. With this change, SEA has doubled the number of students served.

SEA's programs are open to all low-income young people ages 16-29 in King County, Washington. While other college access programs help high-achieving students transfer directly to college after graduation from a traditional high school, we prioritize students who did not successfully complete high school, have experienced homelessness, been in foster care, single parents, and immigrants. Despite these barriers, 79% of SEA students enrolled in college have graduated or remain in good academic standing. By comparison, only 58% of community college students graduate regardless of socioeconomic background.

King County Employment and Education Resources

Staff Lead: Jamie McAuliffe, Aspen Institute Forum for Community Solutionss

King County's Department of Community and Human Services provides equitable opportunities for people to be healthy, happy, self-reliant and connected to the community. Through the Employment and Education Resources Division (EER), DCHS offers a variety of programs and services including job skills training, vocational education, GED attainment, job placement and college and career navigation. King County EER also plays a leadership role in King County Re-engagement Provider Network, the Seattle-King County WorkSource System.

This site visit will take place at YouthSource, its South King County Re-engagement Center, which offers comprehensive services to opportunity youth. Reconnect to Opportunity, a young-adult led outreach effort to connect opportunity youth with best-fit pathways within the system, is operated by King County EER and co-located at YouthSource. Career LaunchPad is King County EER's newest program strategy, which places Career Navigators at various Re-engagement Centers throughout King County to support young people with their employment needs, in an effort to keep them engaged in school.

South Seattle College, Georgetown Campus & Apprenticeship Training Center

Staff Lead: Yelena Nemoy, Aspen Institute Forum for Community Solutions

Regional momentum is building in King County around apprenticeship, youth apprenticeship and pre-apprenticeship. The Georgetown Campus of South Seattle College plays an important role in terms of regional partnerships and also is home to many pathways, training over 3,000 apprentices and journey-level workers annually in 60 different trades. Each of the on-campus training centers provides classroom and laboratory space with training equipment focused upon specific industry needs. Each program offers certificate options. The variety of certificates plus an associate degree option provide students with the flexibility to reach their personal goals. The apprenticeship programs offer immediate employment while training at family-wage jobs. Students learn in the classroom and labs with the college and obtain practical hands-on experience in the industry. The curriculum is developed in collaboration with business, labor, industry, and aovernment through apprenticeship training committees, industry coalitions, and regulatory agencies. Employers and industry leaders are actively involved in training advancements and product development. This site visit will highlight apprenticeship pathways at South Seattle College, as well as how King County education and workforce entities are working together to develop and expand cross-system partnerships to increase access to apprenticeship, youth apprenticeship, and pre-apprenticeship opportunities.

Starbucks White Center Training Store

Staff Lead: Emma Uman, Aspen Institute Forum for Community Solutions

On August 4, 2017, the Starbucks Coffee Company opened a store located in White Center, WA, an area about 10 miles south of Seattle. The store is part of the company's initiative to invest in at least 15 underserved communities across the U.S. by 2018 by creating local jobs, partnering with area nonprofit organizations to provide in-store job-skills training for youth, and working with local women- and minority-owned contractors, suppliers and vendors. A hallmark of the Starbucks stores located in underserved areas is the vision that they double as community hubs. To that end, each store houses a training space where a local nonprofit leads job skills training for community members. In White Center, the YWCA Greenbridge Youth Employment Program facilitates the training programs. When the classrooms are not in use, they're available for community programming such as Coffee with Cops, live music, and other meetings/discussions requested by the local organizations and other community members.

The White Center location was the seventh such store to open in the country. There are currently ten community stores nationwide; the others are in Jamaica Queens, NY; Ferguson, MO; Phoenix, AZ; Chicago, IL; Baltimore, MD; Long Beach, CA; Miami Gardens; Trenton, NJ; Brooklyn, NY.

Treehouse

Staff Lead: Sheri Brady, Aspen Institute Forum for Community Solutions

Treehouse envisions – and strives to create – a world where every child that has experienced foster care has the opportunities and support they need to pursue their dreams and become productive members of our community. Treehouse provides academic and other essential support for more than 7,500 foster youth each year, toward the goal of ensuring that all foster youth in Washington graduate from high school at the same rate as their peers with a plan for their future. The extended graduation rate for foster youth in Treehouse's Graduation Success program is 89 percent – 7 percent higher than the rate for all students in Washington. This rate includes graduates throughout King County, and a growing number of school districts in Pierce and Spokane counties.

In stark contrast, the extended graduation rate for youth in foster care statewide is just 49 percent. This rate has spurred Treehouse to scale up it work and focus on a new statewide goal: By 2022, youth in foster care across Washington state will graduate from high school at the same rate as their peers, with support and a plan to launch successfully into adulthood.
