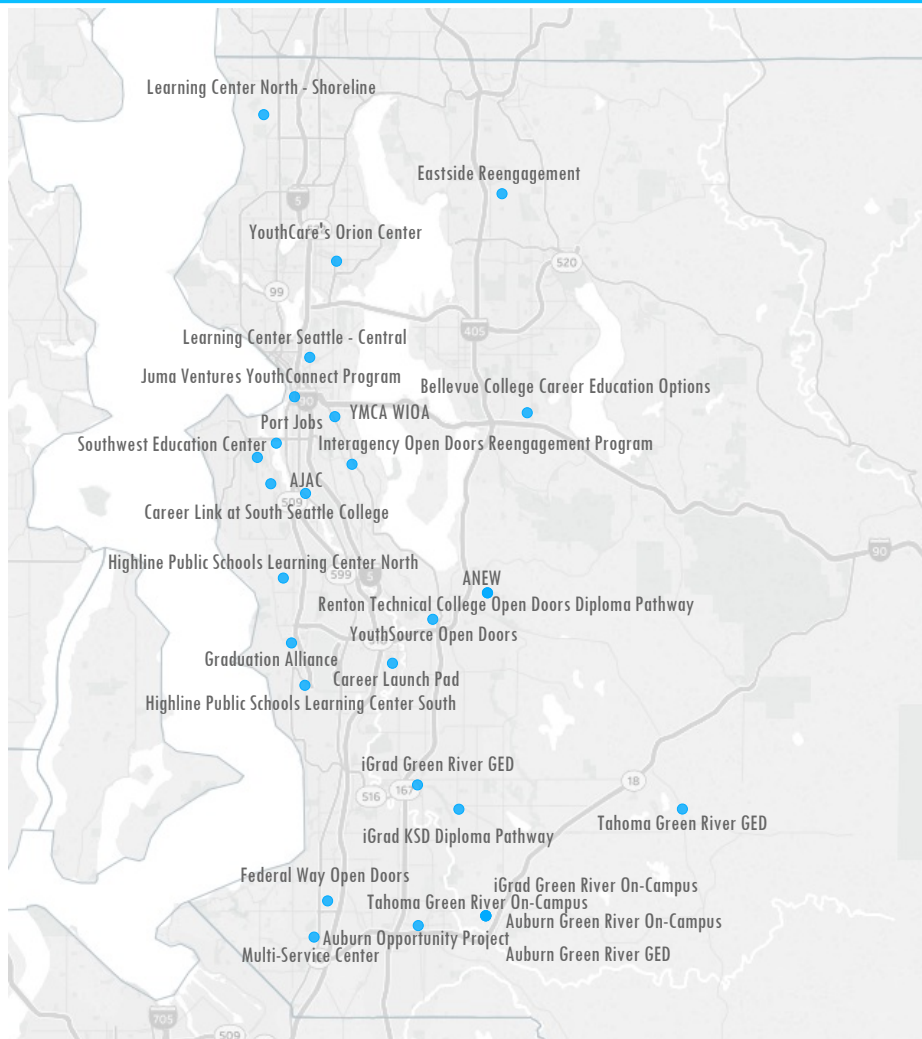

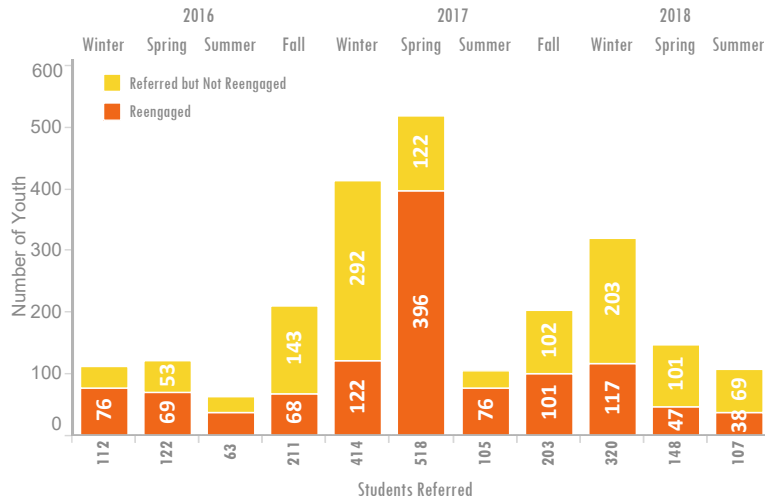

OUTREACH HIGHLIGHTS

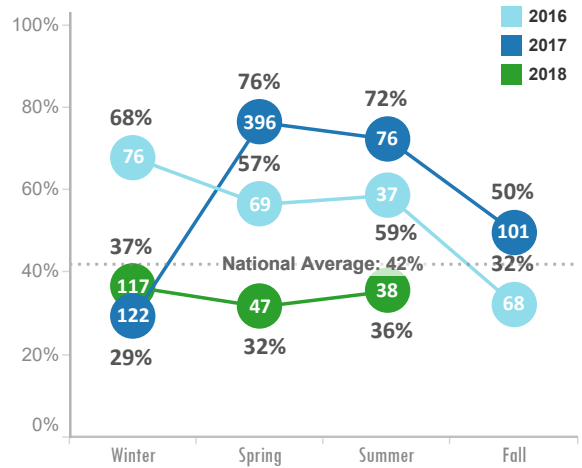
King County Reconnect to Opportunity (ReOpp) helps young people reengage in a best-fit education program or employment. During the 2018 Summer quarter, 36% of referred youth reengaged! As shown in the figures below, this quarter ReOpp worked with 107 youth and 38 of referred youth were formally enrolled in a King County reengagement program or employment.

1,147 young people have been reengaged since January 2016! That is 49% of the 2,323 total youth referred to ReOpp --a rate higher than the national reengagement rate of 42%.

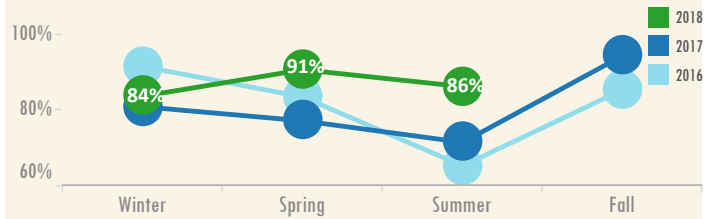

OPEN DOORS QUARTERLY STUDENT BILLABILITY (1+mo.)



For students to be billable under Open Doors they must meet a combination of requirements: meeting minimum monthly attendance; having weekly program contact; and making academic progress.

QUARTERLY DEMOGRAPHICS

Most students served in participating King County reengagement programs are students-of-color and many are low-income. These overall student demographics vary little quarter-to-quarter. Below are demographics and barriers among students enrolled in the current quarter. Keep in mind that totals vary based on data completeness across programs.

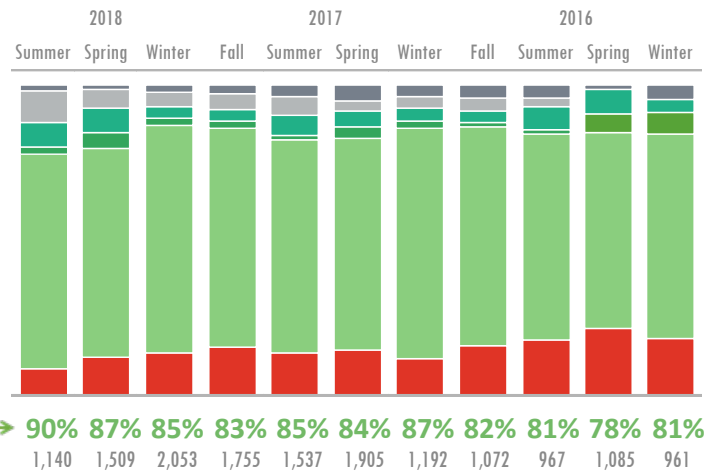

END OF QUARTER STATUS

The following measures present a snapshot of student success quarter-to-quarter and can help answer questions like: at the end of each quarter what proportion of students were still enrolled? How many earned a credential? And of all students served in a given quarter, how many transferred to another education program and how many exited without a credential? Quarterly Stick Rate shows the percentage of youth that remained enrolled during the quarter or exited with a credential.

EXIT STATUS DISTRIBUTION | All Quarters

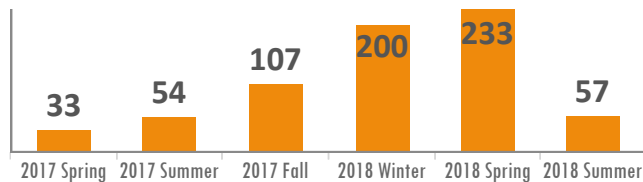


QUARTERLY STICK RATE

In 2018 Summer there were 1,140 students with a positive status (groups in green). To calculate the Stick Rate, divide 1,140 by the total students served 1,264, excluding students who transferred and students who earned credential before the 2018 Summer quarter (groups in grey). $1,140 / 1,264 = 90\%$

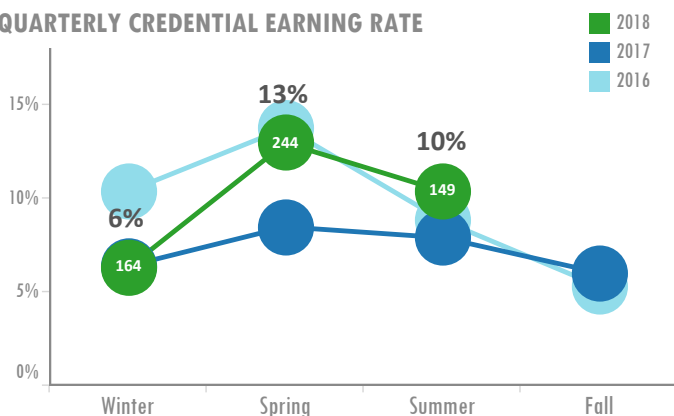
NUMBER OF STUDENTS WHO STARTED A PAID INTERNSHIP OR GAINED EMPLOYMENT



CREDENTIALS EARNED

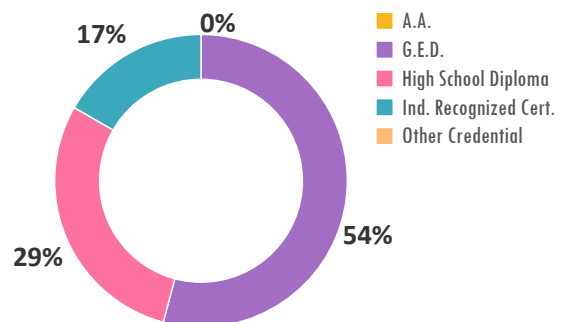
As of the publication of this quarterly report, 1,683 students earned a credential! Each quarter between 100-225 students earn a credential —mostly GEDs and diplomas. Credential earners make up 5-14% of all students enrolled in a given quarter.

TYPE OF CREDENTIALS EARNED | 2018 Summer

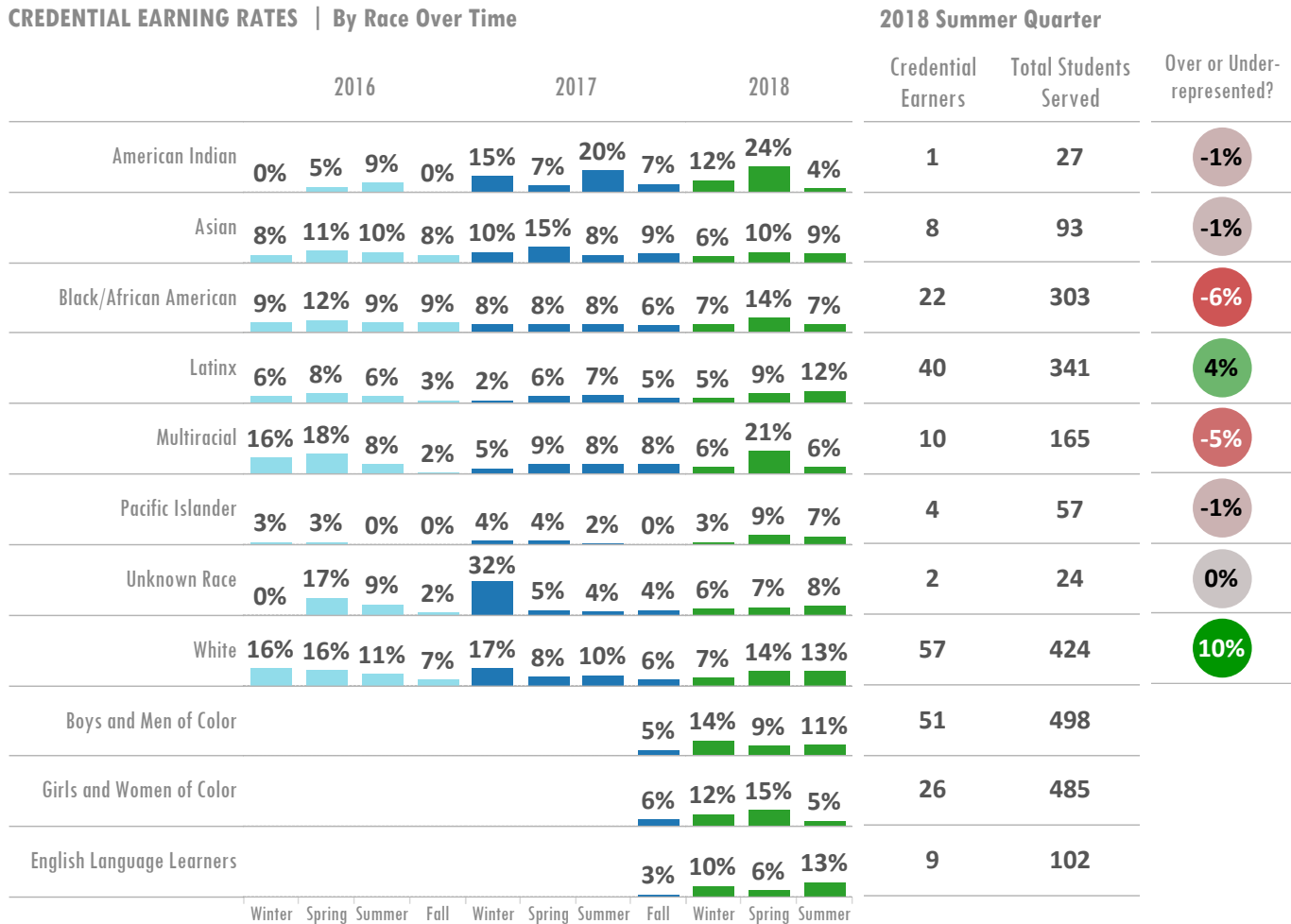

CREDENTIAL EARNING BY RACE

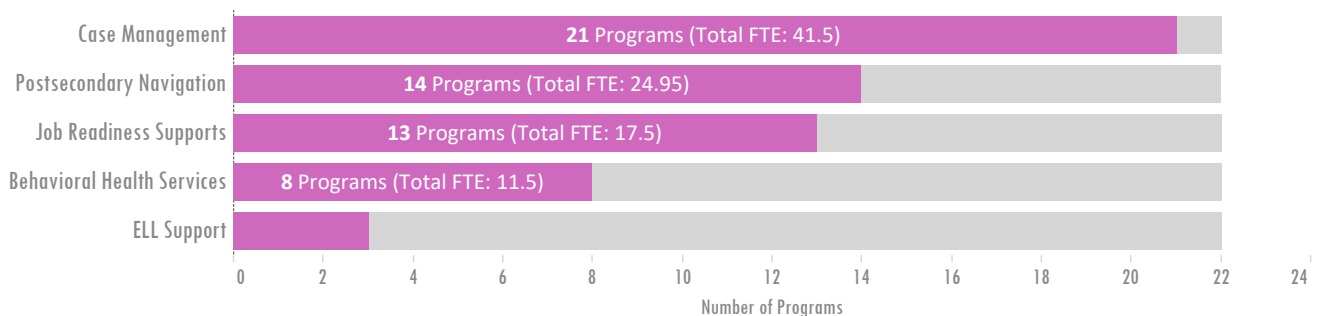
Credential earning rates by race/ethnicity is one way to track how the region is serving young people and the extent to which gaps are closing. For instance, Latinx students are the 2nd largest racial demographic served by the region's reengagement programs, yet students often have the lowest rates of credential earning. There were 341 Latinx students enrolled in all King County reengagement programs in the 2018 Summer quarter, yet only 40 Latinx students earned a credential --a 12% credential earning rate. While the 341 Latinx students are a large group of youth served, these 40 Latinx credential earners are a small portion of all the credential earners this quarter. The extent to which a racial group is over or underrepresented in credential earning is shown in the last column, below.

TRACKING SYSTEM INDICATORS

Instead of only tracking student performance, the region also tracks system characteristics and the conditions that impact young people. Below are supports available in the King County Reengagement Network among programs participating in this data collection effort.

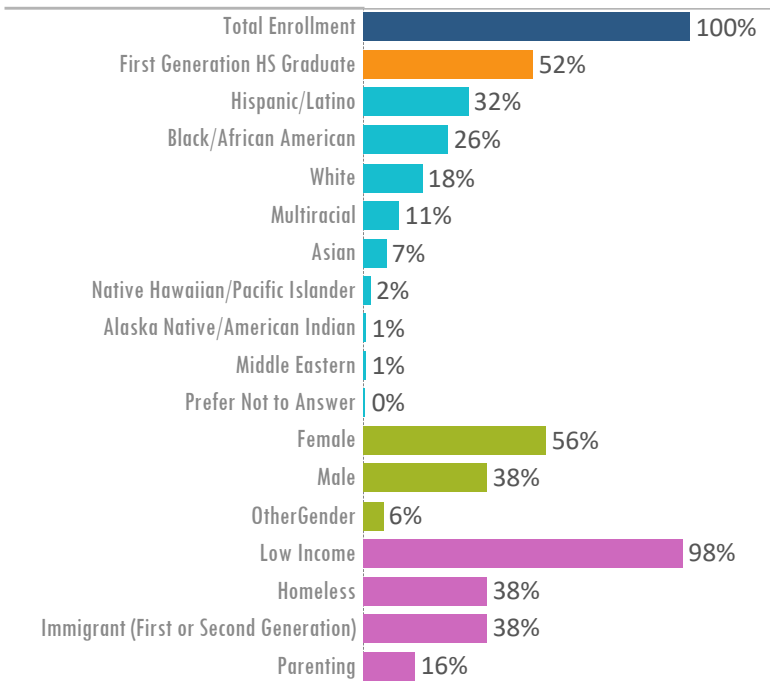

POSTSECONDARY HIGHLIGHTS

Seattle Education Access (SEA) partners with many Open Doors reengagement programs in King County to provide college and career planning and transition support to youth as they near completion of their secondary credential. The data below captures student outcomes from July 1, 2015 - September 30, 2018 within Open Doors reengagement programs in South Seattle and South King County (the Road Map Project region) as supported by a federal Social Innovation Fund grant. Below are the demographics for the 416 students enrolled under this grant.

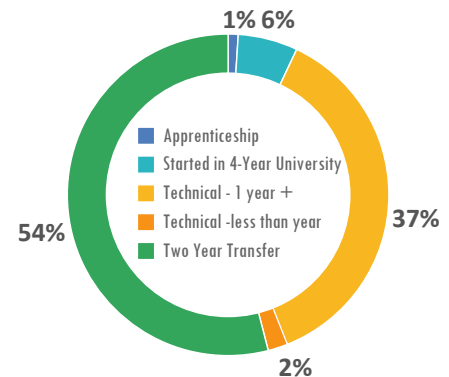
DEMOGRAPHICS AMONG YOUTH RECEIVING POSTSECONDARY NAVIGATION SUPPORT FROM SEA



Over half of SEA students are first generation high school graduates. During this period, of the 350 students enrolled in postsecondary 52% (or 181 students) were also the first in their family to have graduated high school!

Of the 416 Open Doors students receiving navigation support from SEA under this grant, 196 have since enrolled in a postsecondary pathway.

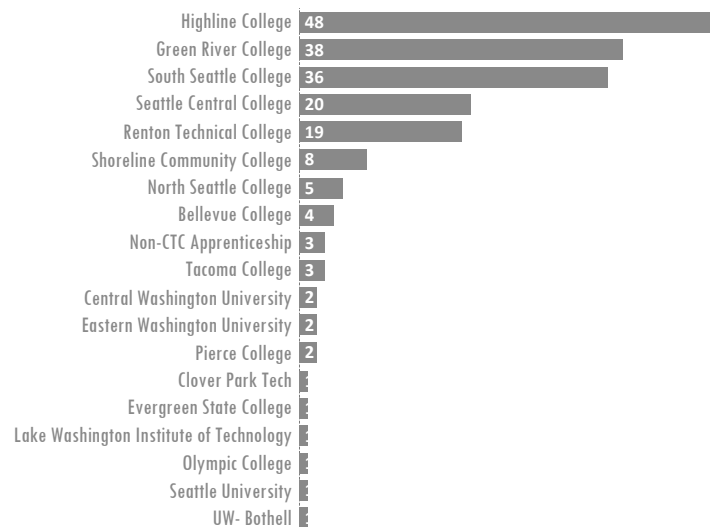
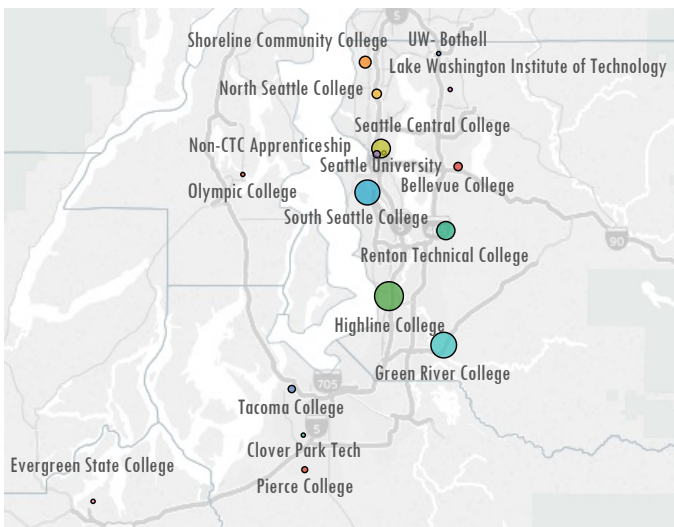
PATHWAYS AMONG THE 196 STUDENTS ENROLLED IN POSTSECONDARY



72% POSTSECONDARY PERSISTENCE

Of the 118 students who first enrolled in postsecondary over a year ago, 72% (or 85 students) have since enrolled in a second year!
